CIVIL WAR TOKENS

During the Civil War, a major coin shortage occurred in the North. People hoarded government coins, and they were worth a premium over other currencies. To try to remedy this situation, some merchants began to issue their own tokens.

Civil War tokens were generally the same size and weight as a standard United States cents being made at the time. The tokens came in two basic themes: tokens issued by tradesmen and pieces made with political or patriotic messages.

Tradesmen's tokens provided change for trade and advertised the dealer's wares. They generally bore some type of promise of redemption in goods or money. To stay with the law, some of the tokens included the word *not* in small letters above the denomination *one cent*. Others, however, were an unauthorized substitute for the government's coins.

Patriotic pieces often carried the likeness of military leaders, politicians, or the Union Flag. Some pieces bear such inscriptions as *The Flag of Our Union* (on the coin Face) and *If Anyone Attempts to Tear It Down, Shoot Him on the Spot* (on the reverse). Others simply promoted Union Forever.

CIVIL WAR SOLDIER RESEARCH

For instance, here is information on one particular Civil War Soldier (who happened to participate in the Atlanta Campaign).

John W Watkins

Personal History

John W Watkins - Captain, 66th Ohio Volunteer Infantry, Company E,

Age - 23

Mustered Into Service - Oct. 19, 1861 as a 2nd Lieutenant with a term of enlistment of 3 years

On December 26, 1861 he was commissioned into Company "E" of the 66th Ohio Infantry

Term of Enlistment - 3 yrs.

- Appointed 2d Lieutenant Nov. 30,1861;
- promoted to 1st Lieutenant March 1,1863;
- to Captain May 27, 1863;
- mustered out Dec. 27, 1864, at Savannah, Ga., on expiration of term of service.

He was listed as:

- POW (specific date and location not stated, most likely at the Battle of Port Republic, Virginia June 9th, 1862 where the Regiment suffered its largest casualties in the war; 29 killed, 8 wounded, 5 captured).
- Exchanged 9/21/1862 Aiken's Landing, VA (Exchanged for James P Charlton 4th VA)

66th OVI Regimental History

Formed in early December of 1861 from volunteers in and around the town of Urbana in Champaign County, Ohio, the 66th Ohio Volunteer Infantry served until the end of the Civil War in April of 1865. The regiment would serve with the Army of the Potomac in the East as part of the 12th Corps and late in 1863 was transferred to the West to become part of the 20th Corps, Army of the Cumberland, which was under the overall command of William T. Sherman.

66th OVI in the Atlanta Campaign

On May 3, 1864, the 66th marched from Bridgeport to Chattanooga. The regiment next embarked upon the Atlanta Campaign. Before the regiment departed Chattanooga, officials assigned the 66th to the:

- 1st Brigade,
- 2nd Division,
- 20th Corps.

The regiment fought in every major engagement of the Atlanta Campaign, including the Battles of Rocky Face Ridge, Pumpkin Vine Creek, Dallas, Resaca, Kennesaw Mountain, Culp House, Pine Mountain, Marietta, and Atlanta.
